The main objective of the NBB is overall development of scientific beekeeping in the country by popularizing state of the art technologies in beekeeping for quality production of honey & other beehive products and to increase the productivity of crops through pollination support for enhancing the income of the beekeepers/farmers.

- 2. It has been brought to our notice by the beekeeping industry/ exporters that there is some proposal to bring an amendment in honey standards "declaring any honey having more than 20 per cent moisture at raw stage, that needs processing for moisture reduction, may not be considered as pure natural honey". This does not seems to be appropriate, particularly, in case of Tropical Countries, like India, with high relative humidity during honey flow season. Sometimes, even sealed honey from some of the regions may have high moisture (>20% may be upto 24%) which needs processing of honey for 'moisture reduction' to bring it down below to 20 per cent. Some of other Tropical Countries, like Vietnam, etc., have already taken up this matter with you & other authorities.
- 3. Keeping in view the above, and as APIMONDIA is an International Organization which promotes scientific beekeeping for supporting employment and income generation as well as providing livelihoods to millions of poor farmers/beekeepers/others in the world, you are kindly requested to take up the matter with the concerned authorities so that the proposal to bring an amendment in honey standards of not treating processed honey as 'pure natural honey' may not be approved. This seems like a non-tariff trade barriers in International market for very high value Honeys of Tropical Countries like, India, Vietnam etc.

Looking for an early positive response in the matter.
